The Book of Galatians is a mixture between God's gifts and our responsibilities. The first three chapters speak to the <u>identity and status</u> given to believers in Christ. Then the second half, beginning in chapter four turns to the <u>responsibility of the believer to act.</u>

1)Everything completed for us in Christ because of the <u>victory He's already won.</u>
2) How we are to use them to actually receive and experience long-term effects of this victory in our everyday living.

In summary: Believe and receive first, then use what you've been given.

Example is Eph: 6:10-11 "be strong in the Lord" is strength God gives you. Then, "Put on the full armor of God". Here we **activate** the strengthening process.

Like plugging in your cell phone to the charger. Your phone will hold a charge as long as you do what? Plug it into the charger. The charge (strength) is only available to the phone if it is plugged in. We will never receive the full strength in our lives God provides for us if we ignore the spiritual protection He offers.

It must be "plugged into" or the spiritual armor "put on" daily, consistently, faithfully. Why? Spiritual warfare doesn't take a day off. No holidays or vacations. How is "be strong in the Lord" different from "put on the whole armor of God"?

The first we receive, the other we must act on in order to receive the benefit of the first. Satan is hoping you are not motivated, unaware or lazy. He doesn't want you to be aware, armed and active. A good example is the movie "War Room".

Satan also uses many ways to **lure** you in his schemes to deceive and disable you. Think about how smart merchants lure us into buying their products. Name a few. Does it work? Which ones are the most effective? Why? *A change in lure changes everything*. It's different for each person and changes over time. He considers your current situation, your weaknesses/strengths, interests/tendencies, history/past abuses in developing his plan to hit your pressure point/ fears/ hot buttons/anxiety in order to defeat you and take you and your family down.

The battles he brings against you show a deep knowledge of who you are and points where you can be taken down. Consider the people or circumstances you wrote in the oval in the first lesson. In what way are they a specific "hot button"?

THE ENEMY'S STRATEGIES

After polling a large cross section of women, asking them to reveal the primary ways the enemy attacks their lives, several common categories defined their responses. Below are ten of the enemy's favorite strategies to use against God's women as they pursue abundant life in Christ.

Strategy #1—Against Your Passion He seeks to dim your whole desire for prayer, dull your interest in spiritual things, and downplay the potency of your most strategic weapons (Eph. 6:10-20).

Strategy #2—Against Your Focus He disguises himself and manipulates your perspective so you end up focusing on the wrong culprit, directing your weapons at the wrong enemy (2 Cor. 11:14).

Strategy #3—Against Your Identity He magnifies your insecurities, leading you to doubt what God says about you and to disregard what He's given you (Eph. 1:17-19).

Strategy #4—Against Your Family He wants to disintegrate your family, dividing your home, rendering it chaotic, restless, and unfruitful (Gen. 3:1-7).

Strategy #5—Against Your Confidence

He constantly reminds you of your past mistakes and bad choices, hoping to convince you that you're under God's judgment rather than under the blood (Rev. 12:10).

Strategy #6—Against Your Calling He amplifies fear, worry, and anxiety until they're the loudest voices in your head, causing you to deem the adventure of following God too risky to attempt (Josh. 14:8).

Strategy #7—Against Your Purity He tries to tempt you toward certain sins, convincing you that you can tolerate them without risking consequence, knowing they'll only wedge distance between you and God (Isa. 59:1-2).

Strategy #8—Against Your Rest and Contentment

He hopes to overload your life and schedule, pressuring you to constantly push beyond your limits, never feeling permission to say no (Deut. 5:15).

Strategy #9—Against Your Heart
He uses every opportunity to keep old
wounds fresh in mind, knowing that
anger and hurt and bitterness and
unforgiveness will continue to roll the
damage forward (Heb. 12:15).

Strategy #10—Against Your Relationships

He creates disruption and disunity and within your circle of friends and within further shared community of the body of Christ (1 Tim. 2:8).

How can you defend against Satan's attacks? He has a basic game plan of strategies. To understand how to defend against him ask some basic questions:

- In what way am I the biggest threat to the enemy and his purpose?

 Are you vocal about your faith? Then he may bring fear or insecurity in you so you'll keep your mouth shut. Is your marriage strong, a good model of stability for other couples? Then he will try to detour one or both of you away from each other through entanglements. He will want to cripple you in the area of your life where doing so will most directly question God and interfere with His church.
- What are my flesh's tendencies, basic passions, and weaknesses?

 Every human being has interests, passions, and things they are curious about, some good and maybe some bad. Some embarrassing or sensitive we don't like others to know about us. And those things are what the enemy uses against us.
- They may come from: your upbringing, your inborn personality or weaknesses created in your life. When these selections are combined with the right timing of Satan, you know as much as he does about how he may be planning to attack you at the time or place you are the weakest.

It may be <u>alcoholism</u> in the family, the enemy uses it to destroy you through a sensitivity in your mind toward <u>addiction</u>.

<u>If promiscuity</u> has been a part of your history, Satan will want to keep that fire burning in your body while sending tempting offers to lead you astray.

In considering your basic fleshly tendencies, passions and weaknesses how does this give you better understanding into Satan's strategies against you? How can you safeguard yourself from the attacks to lure you into this area of your life?

Keep a close eye on your areas of greatest strength and your areas of greatest weakness. They are likely the places where you can expect the enemy to target his attacks against you. When you know where to look you can see him coming.

PRAYER STRATEGIES

Below you'll find some broad guidelines and framework for your prayer strategies. As you craft your prayers, be authentic, personal, and intentional. You can always come to this page for inspiration and help as you seek to remain anchored and strong in your writing.

My hope is that you'll not only emerge from this Bible study with six strategies locked in place but also a habit for intentional prayer that reverberates throughout the rest of your life.

P—PRAISE: Gratitude to God for who He is and what He's already done should thread throughout every prayer, because ultimately His name and His fame are the only reasons any of this matters.

R—REPENTANCE: Expect prayer to expose where you're still resisting Him—not only resisting His commands, but resisting the manifold blessings and benefits He gives to those who follow. Line your strategies with repentance: the courage to trust, and turn, and walk His way.

A—ASKING: Make your requests known. Be personal and specific. Write down details of your own issues and difficulties as they relate to the broader issue we discussed in that week of study, as well as how you perhaps see the enemy's hand at work in them or where you suspect he might be aiming next.

Y—YES: "All of God's promises," the Bible says, "have been fulfilled in Christ with a resounding 'Yes!" (2 Cor. 1:20, NLT). You may not understand everything that is happening in your life right now, but any possible explanation pales in comparison to what you do know because of your faith in God's goodness and assurances. So allow your prayer to be accentuated with His own words from Scripture, His promises to you that correspond to your need. There is nothing more powerful than praying God's own Word. Because even at the mention of His name, the enemy buckles in certain defeat.
